Dear Chairwoman Dominguez:

We are writing to express our grave concerns about the reorganization plan being proposed by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission ("EEOC"). We are concerned that the proposed reorganization could weaken the EEOC and its ability to enforce federal anti-discrimination laws. We have also just learned that the proposed plan could be voted on by the Commissioners as soon as Monday, May 16. We believe that it would be a serious mistake to rush to a decision on this proposal without much more thorough evaluation, consideration and input from a number of parties.

The EEOC plays a unique and critical role in ensuring that our equal employment laws are respected by employers everywhere. We, therefore, believe that it is imperative that all aspects of the plan and a detailed justification for all proposed changes be provided to Congress and to the public before the proposal is adopted and implemented.

The information we have heard about the plan is troubling for a number of reasons. Reducing the number of district offices from 23 to 15, downgrading them to "field" offices and reducing the number of attorney positions could have a substantial, negative impact on investigation, resolution and enforcement of race discrimination charges across the country. Despite that fact, we are not aware that there has been any opportunity for public comment or input about the proposed changes.

We urge you to postpone consideration of this proposal and to take all steps necessary to ensure that Congress and all communities protected and served by the EEOC can review the proposal and comment on its impact before the vote by the Commissioners.
